What constitutes greatness? In a world dominated by materialism we tend to equate greatness with possessions, wealth, and power. In the Old Testament a man's importance was measured by how many cattle, sheep and other animals he owned. Today we count the cars in the driveway, the number of suits hanging in the closets and the accumulation of electronic gadgets scattered around the house.

When we think of "great" people, we think of international leaders, super jocks, movie idols, rock singers who dress funny and those who have made it to the top position in the company.

It is not strange that the world would measure success this way, but let's don't allow that kind of mindset to invade the Church! If we do, we will think the "great" pastors are the ones who pastor the largest congregations or have TV programs or speak to packed auditoriums. We will think that the big churches are the "great" churches. We will assume that those who wrote the best sellers and the hit songs and have their own film series are the "successful" people in the Kingdom.

Some are going to be blessed of God in the ways mentioned above, but the truth is we can pastor large churches, minister to huge audiences, sell a million books.. and be failures! All of that power and attention can make us self-centered and self-reliant.

Jesus measured greatness in terms of servanthood. In Matthew 23:11 He said, "..he that is the greatest among you shall be your servant." He demonstrated that principle in John 13. Spiritual greatness could further be described in terms of faithfulness, obedience to the Word, and many other qualities we tend to overlook.

Let's not buy into the mindset of the world. Let's be great in God's eyes according to our example, Jesus Christ.

Love the Lord

Things are rough in our world today. We see it in the news, we see it in social media, we see it all over the internet. Things are rough in our world today. In a lot of ways our country is not much different than the nation of Israel in Scripture. We have a lot of "Knowledge" but it isn't the correct knowledge.

As we've seen in our study of our goals, as a congregation, Israel was ignorant of God's righteousness. America has become ignorant of God's righteousness. They failed to understand God's true nature. His holiness and perfection. The utter necessity to be perfect in order to be acceptable to Him and given the right to live in His presence. How many times in Scripture do we read, "Be Koly for I am Koly?"

As we've seen, they had knowledge about God, knew a great deal about Kim, knew some things about Kim, but their knowledge was only partial. What they knew was incomplete. It was not enough. As a result, their knowledge was incorrect. As a result, they did not know God personally. The question arises, "Why did Israel have incomplete and incorrect knowledge of God?" I'm glad you asked. They failed to understand God's true nature. They failed to understand His holiness. They failed to understand His perfection. The utter necessity to be perfect in order to be acceptable to Him. There is a perfection that we have to have in order to be in His presence. That comes through a relationship with Jesus Christ. We're given the right to live in His presence, through the blood of Jesus and a relationship with Kim.

What Israel did was fail to understand that man's true nature is sinful, and in desperate need for perfect righteousness in order to be acceptable to God and given the right to live in God's presence. We can't do it on our own. It doesn't work. No matter how hard we try. No matter how many promises we make. By the end of the day, by the end of writing them down, most of the time by the end of saying the promise, we've broken them. Our human nature takes over and makes us unacceptable to God.

Cautiousness is living within the protection of my God-given resources.

How is the protection of living within God-given resources illustrated in Scripture?

The difference between blind fear and wise caution is spiritual perception. Who increased his faith and spiritual perception and ws able to make a bold decision while those around him hesitated in fear?

William Tyndale, one of England's leading reformers, was approached one day by a sincere-looking young man who offered to help him. In reality, the young man was a spy employed by the Archbishop of Canterbury. Tyndale one of the first men to translate the Bible into English, was arrested, tried for heresy, and on October 6, 1536, was strangled and burned at the stake.

In A.D. 37, one of the early Church leaders was approached by a sincere-looking man who offered to help him and the other Christians. Most of the Christians, however, were in hiding from this very man!

Burning with hatred, he had dedicated himself to one cause—the destruction of anyone who followed Christ. He regarded them as politically and spiritually dangerous. His unrelenting persecution had already resulted in the murder of one Christian and the imprisonment of many others.

Armed with new authority from the religious leaders of his day, he traveled from city to city to broaden his attack against the followers of Christ.

This was the background of the man who now offered to help the people he had so recently persecuted. Little wonder all the Church leaders had fled from him. All, except one man.

This leader was a man of Godly reputation. He had been a wealthy landowner on the island of Cyprus, who after believing had totally dedicated himself and all his possessions to the Lord. That complete dedication included selling his land and giving the money to the Apostels to sustain the needy Christians. In return God gave him a greater faith which increased his ability to discern the motives of others.

The leader cautiously listened as the man who had so oppressed the believers told how God had struck him and his companions to the ground with a brilliant light. The man also revealed that he had heard the voice of Christ from heaven asking him why he was persecuting Him. This experience, claimed the man, had brought him to repentence. He himself was now a follower of Christ.

As the respected leader listened, he percieved a spirit like his own, the spirit of one totally dedicated to the Lord. With confidence he brought the man to the Apostels and introduced him as a new brother in Christ.

Because God had provided Barnabas with special wisdom and insight, he was able to open the door of fellowship to a new convert. He later helped open the Mediterranean world to the Gospel during missionary journeys with this same man—the Apostle Paul.

When Barnabas kindly received Paul as a brother in the Lord, he demonstrated his confidense in the Lord to protect him from a possible trap. This spiritual discernment was a God-given resource that would continue to benefit him and Paul throughout their missionary journeys.
